

## Severe Weather Activity Kentucky

- Powerful tornadoes tore through five states in the South and Midwest Friday night, one of which tore a frightening path across several Kentucky communities.
- Storms started popping off to the west in Missouri in the early evening.
- That same supercell traveled more than 500 miles, bringing tornadoes all the way over to southeast Kentucky overnight.



- The Governor of Kentucky said that, as of 1 p.m. EDT Saturday, there were 18 confirmed deaths connected to the severe weather. The fatalities include 17 people in Laurel County and one in Pulaski County.
- One of the hardest hit areas was London n Laurel County, about 75 miles south of Lexington.
- Homes and businesses were leveled in Somerset, in Pulaski County, after a tornado with a preliminary rating of EF-2 tore across that community, but officials there say the situation could have been far worse.
- In Laurel County, Emergency services are still searching for survivors amid the wreckage and the death toll there is expected to rise.
- The storms knocked out power for 170,000 people across the state, and there are more than 700 personnel on the ground helping to restore it.
- The National Weather Service is surveying the damage.
- The governor declared a state of emergency ahead of the storms on May 16<sup>th</sup>.

## Missouri

- At least seven people were killed in Missouri, and emergency crews were still searching building to building for survivors. Dozens more people were injured, including several in serious condition.
- The National Weather Service confirmed that one particularly destructive tornado in Missouri was a powerful EF3, with winds of 150 mph. That tornado touched down in Clayton, Missouri, a suburb of St. Louis, and moved rapidly toward the north side of the city.
- Initial estimates found the path was at least 8 miles long, and the NWS says it likely continued much farther into Illinois. More than 5,000 buildings in Clayton sustained damage, officials said.
- Three shelters open with 98 occupants.
- Gov. Mike Kehoe said he has been in contact with federal officials about getting disaster relief.



## Severe Weather Outlook Central Plains

- The FOX Forecast Center warns that a wide region from Kansas and Oklahoma extending into parts of Missouri and Arkansas is expected to experience severe thunderstorms.
- By early afternoon, eastern Kansas,
  Oklahoma, northern Texas and the Ozarks
  will be primed for severe storms to develop.
- "The thunderstorm development that we're expecting later today could produce some very large tornadoes," FOX Weather Meteorologist Britta Merwin said.
- Some of the tornadoes could be intense (EF-3 or stronger), with very large hail and severe winds.
- Multiple lines of severe storms will push eastward into Missouri and Arkansas, carrying the threat of damaging winds and embedded tornadoes.
- Severe thunderstorms will rumble into Tuesday across parts of the Ohio Valley and the mid-Mississippi and Tennessee valleys.
- Farther south initial supercells will pose a risk of all severe storm threats, including the potential for strong tornadoes
- By Wednesday, the cold front will be along the mid-Atlantic and Carolina coastlines.
